# Say Thank You and You are Welcome Dr. Jesse Brunson

In Philippians Chapter 4, the Apostle Paul writes to the Philippi church to encourage them in the faith and to give thanks for their enduring commitment. This congregation was beloved of Paul; such love is expressed as he shares his heartfelt thoughts in the opening paragraphs in this letter.

He says, *I give my thanks to God every time I remember you.* He goes on to explain, *in all my prayers for all of you.* In this Paul was clearly telling the Philippian Church how special they were to him and to God.

This church was special to Paul because it was the first church he founded in the Macedonia territory. In the book of Acts we are reminded that Paul, on his first missionary journey, was instructed in a vision of a man pleading with him to *come over to Macedonia and help us.* 

So Paul set sail from Troas down to Philippi, the leading city in Macedonia. The bible says, on the first Sabbath day his ministry team went outside the gate to the river in a place of prayer. There they preached to the women gathered. It was in that place that Paul had his first convert, whose name was Lydia. She opened her heart to the word of God and she and her family were baptized.

In this letter Paul writes to this wonderful congregation to thank them and encourage them. This letter is filled with references of thanksgiving for this community of the faithful. Paul offers thanksgiving for the history he shares with them, saying that in the early days of his preaching no church shared with him in giving and receiving. He says, *even when I was in Thessalonica you sent me help for my needs more than once.* 

One day a little child and her mother went shopping in the grocery market. A stock clerk was doing a beautiful display of oranges. So when they got close to the clerk, he gave the little girl a big, beautiful orange. The mother said to the girl, 'now what do you say to the nice man?' The little girl held up the orange to the man and said, 'peel it for me.' This illustration indicates that human kindness in saying 'thank you' or 'you are welcome' has been lost.

When someone holds a door for you, is it not human kindness being displayed? ,Would not the proper response be 'thank you' and in return the person holding the door says 'you are welcome?' We take so much for granted in this life, but when we understand the grace of God and His abundant love, we can express that gratitude as Paul did with the Philippian Church, "thank you.' And the church responds back, 'you are welcome ,Paul.'

Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8 There is a season for everything....

#### from Mary Zigbuo, Global Ministries Missionary serving in Liberia

Warm greetings from Liberia where I am completing a special six-month Ebola response and health strengthening support assignment. Over the past months, I've had the privilege of serving alongside my Liberian colleagues towards our collective goal of responding to the Ebola crisis while also ensuring the continuous operation and ongoing development of our healthcare system.

I've supported four UMCOR International Disaster Response Ebola interventions, traveling throughout the country. I am a witness of the United Methodist Church of Liberia's relevant, resourceful, Christ-centered ministries of education, healthcare, social justice, agriculture and other remarkable ministries aimed at improving the quality of life for God's people throughout Liberia.

Thank you for your prayerful, material and financial support that strengthened UMC Liberia's efforts to respond to Ebola, while at the same time provide quality, affordable healthcare for rural, subsistence farming families.

There are many lessons learned during the Ebola crisis that resulted in some positive behavior changes among families: Hand washing throughout the day, meal sharing discouraged, body preparation for burial, and awareness of Ebola symptoms. And, many more long-term changes that will be integrated into the habits and customs of individuals, institutions and communities, thus providing a conducive environment for promoting a healthy society.

# **Encouragement to Join the Prayer Ministry**

Come join us! Here is reassurance that you that you have all that you need to pray with us.

Concern	Encouragement
I don't know how to pray.	Prayer is talking to God about what is on your heart. Just as you would talk to a family member or friend, you can talk to God in the same way. No special words or approaches are needed.
I don't like to pray out loud.	We have had members who pray silently during our meetings. Your presence gives strength, meaning and support. You also help us live God's word, "When two or more people are gathered in my name"
I don't know who or what to pray for.	There may be meetings where you don't know what to say. No person or situation may come to your mind. As you are with us and let yourself be guided by the Holy Spirit, eventually, you will be able to add prayers. Truly!
What is expected of me if I participate in the prayer ministry?	Ideally, it is helpful if you come to the monthly meetings, agree to contact prayer requestors, pray at home at least once a week for the people on our prayer list; and, help out with various projects from time to time. It is okay to do all or some of these things.
You mentioned calling prayer requestors. I don't like to call people.	We do try to reach out to our prayer requestors (the people who have requested prayer for others) to see if the person we are praying for needs continued prayer or not. There are other ways to get this information; such as seeing the person in church or sending a quick email. If you are not able to reach out at all; there are other ways to contribute to this ministry.
When do you meet?	Our meetings are on the 3 <sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of every month from 6:30 to 8:00 pm. Some of us may need to leave early to practice with the choir, attend Tai Chi class or some other activitythat is fine.
What do you do during meetings?	Our typical agenda includes an opening prayer to praise God and to guide us through the meeting; discussing people on the prayer list to see which people still need prayer and which of our prayers God has answered; planning for any projects we are led to do; and, praying for all of the people and situations we are led to pray for.
I don't know how much time I can give to the prayer ministry.	We have had people come and go from participating in the monthly meetings. As family, health and other issues need attention; some prayer ministry members withdraw for a while, then come back to us. And, as mentioned above, it is possible to contribute fully to all of our prayer ministry activities or just some of them.

## Ali DeLeo begins as Director of Youth Ministry on August 16!

Ali DeLeo was born and raised in Dover, Delaware. Discipled throughout her childhood and youth at Wesley United Methodist Church in Dover, some of Ali's earliest memories of understanding of God's grace and presence were in the midst of joyous occasions like playing sports, time at the beach, Sunday worship, UMYF, and at Camp Pecometh. Ali attended Duke University on an athletic scholarship, graduating with a degree in Psychology with minors in Emergency Medicine and Religion. She earned Masters and Doctoral degrees in physical therapy, and became a clinician and professor at George Washington University School of Medicine. In addition to her vocational responsibilities, Ali served as the Director of Youth and Children's Theatre at Church Hill Theatre near Chestertown, MD.

Ali began discerning a call to leave healthcare and teaching to enter ministry while worshipping and serving at Capitol Hill United Methodist Church in Washington, DC – a vibrant church poised at the intersection of power and poverty just four blocks from Congress. In addition to worship responsibilities, Ali served as the Coordinator of Missions, which include unhoused (homeless) ministries, eco-green ministry, reconciling ministry, local & regional missions, and world missions. She also helped develop children and youth ministries at CHUMC. Drawn into life in the church, Ali both witnessed and participated in Christ's radical hospitality and was awakened to the power of the Holy Spirit afresh in her life. Relationships with unhoused friends who live on the margins expanded her vision of God's love, showed her the power of the Gospel to transform lives, and affirmed her call to ministry. As Ali continued her journey, she recognized that God was calling her out of one life and into a new one – to proclaim God's love, redemption, and healing in a broken world that so desperately needs the good news of the resurrection.

Last fall, Ali was honored to return to Duke to start a Masters of Divinity degree. In addition to her love of all things "Blue Devil," Ali enjoys Broadway musicals, running and playing with her dog, Violet. This summer, she served as a ministry intern at North UMC in Indianapolis, Indiana. She gives thanks to God for the opportunity to learn, grow, and serve at Pleasant Green UMC as the Youth Formation Director beginning in August.

The boxes are unpacked and our home in the South Durham area is feeling more settled. Now, where did I put the hammer? We may not have the pictures hung just yet, but I am glad to be here among you!

My appointment to the Corridor District places me back in the area of my birth and years in school. It is an appointment that will challenge me and stretch my faith, at times, as have all my other places of service in the United Methodist Church. # The United Methodist Women's "Christmas in July" **Mission Project**


