### Longing for Lent

Perhaps you have seen the silly memes floating around on the internet: "glad it only rained twice this winter, once for 30 days and then again for 45 days." It has rained.... and rained and rained. Maybe it's just me but it has felt extra dark and gloomy in the winter months. While I am ready for the warm sensation of sunshine on the skin, it has also made me miss my trail running. When it's muddy and wet, I can't get in a good trail run (or walk for that matter!). Yes, I've missed the wilderness. Maybe it's one of the reasons I love the season of Lent – a season that begins with that story of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness for 40 days and a time when we have been exploring those formative Old Testament texts, stories of a wilderness people being shaped into the people of God. I'm fond of the wilderness, but it's also a time and place where questions get asked and we have to do some hard self-work. It's a season that often comes with some fasting, or at least getting rid of the things that hinder us from God and neighbor.

Lent comes from an old English word meaning "spring." Perhaps it is also the lengthening of days I am longing for – and it just so happens that not only is the earth moving toward the spring equinox but our liturgical season also invites us into a springtime of the soul. One night I was practicing a little yoga with the help of a You Tube video. The instructor caught my attention when she said, "when you start to feel resistance, lean in to that. Hold it. Breathe in to that space." What if we also did that with our spirits and souls? To lean in to those places we feel resistance. To hold that space and breathe into it?

Each Sunday morning, we've been journeying through a number of scriptures that have brought us face to face with parts of our lives that perhaps we need to let go of or particular practices we could pick up in order to cultivate a life of discipleship. Which parts of you own life you could lean in to more that would help your soul bloom this spring?

Deuteronomy 26 helped us asked that question, "What does a practice of giving my first fruits to God look like in my life?

Genesis 15 challenged us with the question of "how to keep the faith when promises are delayed? How does our faith translate into trust in God's future?"

Isaiah 55 redirected our attention from those strivings in our lives that we *think* will quench our souls and calls us back to God, our true source of satisfaction.

Luke 15 confronts us with our longing to reconcile and be reconciled, with neighbors and with God. Isaiah 43, on the fifth Sunday of Lent, will help us ask that question, "what new thing is God doing among us?"

Are there places you have been feeling some resistance – a call to give first fruits, or a challenge to trust in God more deeply, or to be reconciled with a neighbor? Is there something you need to let go of in order to cultivate God's good purposes in your life? Easter is coming, but be encouraged during this wilderness time. The Lenten season invites us to lean in. Hold space. Breathe some life into those corners of our lives. If we do, we may just find that it leads to a spring time of the soul.



- Provided more than 4 million life-saving bed nets Insecticide-treated bed nets remains the most effective way to prevent malaria. Since The United Methodist Church began its effort, which has included bed net distributions, global mortality rates have fallen by an estimated 60 percent.
- Renovated 61 healthcare facilities
- Treated more than 2.7 million people with malaria
- Protected more than 175,000 structures with indoor residual spraying
- Trained thousands of community health workers and volunteers



# **Pew Registration Pads**

If you have attended the 11:00 worship service lately, you have undoubtedly heard Sandy Quinn encourage you to sign the registration pad found at the end of the pew, pass it along to the next person, and then pass it back to its original spot at the end of the pew. Have you ever wondered why you are being asked to do this?

The information provided is used in several ways. First, this is a way in which visitors can identify themselves and provide their contact information. When someone visits the 11:00 service and signs the pad, a church member who lives nearby them is asked to follow up with them through a phone call, email, or personal visit. They are welcomed to the church and any questions they have are answered. Sometimes they are also given a small gift from the church. This can be the start of a meaningful relationship as that visitor tries to find his/her "place" within our church family.

When existing church members and friends sign the registration pad, it gives them a way to alert the church office to any changes in their address, phone number, or email address. In addition, the Membership Committee uses the registration pads to keep track of church attendance. Members of this committee occasionally contact people who have not been in worship for a few months to let them know they are missed.

Because attendance at the 8:30 worship service is lighter, registration pads are not used, but a record is still kept of who has attended the service, and who may have visited.

The next time you are in the 11:00 worship service, please do sign the registration pad!


