Dear Pleasant Green,

What strange days we are living. March was certainly one for the books and for the first time ever in our lives, an April calendar has completely been erased, cancelled, cleared. One thing I have been doing during this strange season is to keep a document on my computer called "Inspiration during Isolation." The latest thing I added to this document was a verse from an old familiar hymn. In 1872, Elizabeth Clephane penned the words to the hymn we oftentimes will sing during Lent and Holy Week:

Beneath the cross of Jesus I fain would take my stand,
The shadow of a mighty rock within a weary land;
A home within the wilderness a rest upon the way,
From the burning of the noontide heat, and the burden of the day.

As we continue to move through the living of these days, I'm holding tightly the truth of acknowledging where our refuge, safety and protection really lie. To those of you at home, adjusting to quieter or lonelier days, you are not alone. We are praying for you and hope that you would be aware of a sense of community around you. Above all, that you would know you are held gently in God's hand.

To those of you working from home, or suddenly homeschooling, and seeking to find some balance and normalcy, we are praying for you, too. We pray for patience and endurance, for reliable technology, and for moments of unexpected joy.

To those of you now unemployed or facing instability, we are here for you. We are praying for your strength and perseverance, and that you might be open to receiving help where and when we (and others) can offer it.

To those of you missing their friends at school, a final year of high school or college, we are praying for you. We celebrate who you are and acknowledge that you are feeling sadness for missing end of year celebrations. May God grant you wisdom in this season and grace for each and every day.

- Weekly emails with announcements and helpful information





The Coronavirus, Abundance, Hope, and Easter



Matthew 10:31 - Don't be afraid. You are worth more than many sparrows.

Luke 12: 32 – Don't be afraid, little flock, because your Father delights in giving you the Kingdom.

This month, since COVID-19 (Coronavirus) is still so much in the news, with many related reports of anxiety and fear among us, let us focus on how God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit are the antidote to fear and anxiety. In the 8:30 am service several weeks ago, to launch us into Lent, Janice shared the advice she had heard, "Fast from Fear and Feast on Hope (See box insert for full reference)." And, in the Clyde Walker class, while re-studying John Ortberg's, *If you Want to Walk on Water, You Need to Get Out of the Boat,* we learned that there are 366 scripture verses related to fear. Many verses are related to fear of the Lord (that is a good thing!) and others are telling us not to be afraid of general life conditions. That includes not being afraid, worried, or anxious about the Coronavirus and its ramifications.

You may be worried about becoming very ill from the virus, even dying, or loved ones dying, not being able to go to work, get paid, pay bills, take care of your children or aging parents, purchase food and medicines, or many other things, such as isolation and disruption in your usual routines. While all of this may seem overwhelming, this is where Easter comes in!

Jesus, through the Grace of Our Father, did not stay dead. After his three days in the tomb, Jesus came back to life, being the symbol of everlasting life and hope. Jesus is always with us. He is always willing to listen to our fears. He always answers, based on His perfect timing, wisdom, and planning. He wants the best for us. He, through Our Father, has a plan for us. He and we serve a God of Abundance: abundant hope, peace, calm, direction, resources, problems resolved. God has enough to go around, everyone getting exactly what they need.

Let us Feast on this Hope of Jesus this season, soaking in the abundance of his peace and calm by praying...

Dear God of Abundant Peace and Calm, thank you for listening to our prayers. Thank you for giving us your Son, Jesus, who listens and answers when we cry out to Him in despair and worry. Resurrected Jesus, we lay at Your feet all our fears, worries, and anxieties, all our tensions and pre-occupations with problems. We ask that you take them from us. We freely release these negative thoughts and feelings to you. Fill us with your peace and calm. Help us understand your plans for us; and, trust that through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we will draw closer to you and trust you even more. Help us to know that even if we do not understand your plans or outcomes, you are with us to provide comfort. Help us rely on your will and not ours, knowing that we are not alone in whatever situations we are facing. We pray these things in Your Name and through the Power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

**This is the full reference to the encouragement Janice shared with us. She substituted hope for faith; both are appropriate. This advice was written by Arthur Lichtenberger, a Bishop of the Episcopal Church who died in 1968. Here's the full list:

Fast from jealousy, and *feast* on humility **Fast** from criticism, and *feast* on praise **Fast** from self-pity, and *feast* on joy Fast from pride, and feast on love **Fast** from ill temper, and *feast* on peace Fast from selfishness, and *feast* on service **Fast** from resentment. and *feast* on contentment Fast from fear, and *feast* on faith

Pleasant Green Community Center News continued from March

The bottom five rows of German siding (to match the original siding) was replaced and painted. The front door glass has been replaced twice—and the door opens easily now. The water heater has been replaced, there have been water line improvements to ensure that water drains out completely and does not freeze up in cold weather, and new counter tops were installed not long ago.

An ongoing issue at the building is squirrel damage. Squirrels continue to harass and chew whatever they can sink their teeth into. A new chimney cap was installed to help keep them out, but there have been numerous other repairs to walls and wiring due to squirrel vandalism. It is ongoing, because they continue to find news ways to get in and create problems.

Some of these improvements are not visible, but we do benefit from them each time we, or anyone who rents the building, uses it. There have been and are many other smaller facility repairs and improvements, as must be done to any building frequently rented to the public. While some repairs are completed by contractors, most small repairs are completed by Phil Ray and/or Tim Fowler. A building of this age has ongoing maintenance needs—it is a work in progress!

The Pleasant Green Community Center is maintained by a small group of volunteers, and there is a list of "what to do" when the building is rented. Most people are good about following the guidelines, cleaning up, and leaving the building the same way it was when they arrived. If they do not, a small group of people have to inspect and clean up right away. The building is rented almost every weekend, so there is little time to wait and clean up later. While a deposit is required to reserve the building, some renters will forfeit their deposit because they do not want to clean up. This leaves a big cleanup job that must be completed immediately, before the renter for the next day arrives to use the building. This cleanup job usually falls to Phil and Betty Ray.

You might wonder—"how does the Community Center operate"?

- (1) If you are interested in renting the building, you can review available dates on the PGCC website, www.pleasantgreencommunitycenter.com, which also provides some history and other information. You can call one of the two rental agents to inquire about reserving a date: Phil Ray, 919-493-1780, or Tim Fowler, 919-383-7728.
- (2) The current officers of Pleasant Green Community Center are Phil Ray, President, Larry Flannery, Vice-President, and Sandy Quinn, Treasurer. Mike Quinn is the website administrator. Phil and Sandy meet on a monthly basis to discuss financial data, and Larry and Tim provide input via phone or email. All expenses and income are documented and approved by the officers, with receipts and invoices maintained by the treasurer, who is responsible for all deposits and payments pertaining to the Pleasant Green Community Center. We, the officers of Pleasant Green Community Center, serve as volunteers to help maintain this community treasure. We hope you will join us in preserving and celebrating the life we share in this building.

During 1942 through 1945, Camp Butner's primary mission was to train combat troops for deployment and redeployment to the European and Pacific theaters. The Camp contained rifle & artillery ranges, a prisoner of war compound, and barracks with support services for approximately 40,000 troops.

Beginning on Thanksgiving Day 1948, a large mess hall was disassembled at Camp Butner by adults and youth of Pleasant Green Church, transported to where it now sits and reassembled piece by piece.
