



# Roots & Branches

August 2019

"It is not wrong to go back and fetch that which you have forgotten."

This is an African phrase that I often return to when I need to remember, to retrieve, to reconnect with my roots. The phrase takes it's form and shape in the image of a bird that has it's body moving forward and it's neck and head looking back. The bird is known as a "Sankofa" bird, from the Akan tribe in Ghana. Sankofa translates to "go back and get." To the Akan people, this powerful symbol was a visual reminder that learning from the past and embracing the past ensures and moves us into a strong future.



Once upon a time, at the dawn of Methodism, the church was not defined by formal structures, doctrine, or lines of authority. The church was defined by connectionalism – specifically to God and to each other. We have always been a people who have held interpersonal connections in high regard. It is the essence of who we are as United Methodists. Originally, this took shape as connections among people: connections between pastor and pastor, between pastor and laity, between laity and laity. Eventually this moved into small bands, societies, circuits, Annual Conferences, Jurisdictions, ministry networks, districts, Conferences – all tied together through a network of relationships. *It is not wrong to go back and fetch that which you have forgotten*.



Almost a year ago, several of us pastors in Orange County started getting together once a month. At the start, the purpose was simple. We wanted to be connected to each other, especially during a time when institutional angst was high (remembery General Conference?); we wanted to commit to living and working together, to be in relation-

ship together despite what happens, despite the tensions that will come. In the beginning, we simply committed to gathering and building deep trust. Over time we started asking questions of ourselves, "what would it look like to be better neighbors? To strengthen community connections? To work together for the upbuilding of our community and county?"

Over the past 8 months, what has taken shape among us is what is traditionally called a "Cooperative Parish" model of ministry – a long held tradition in our Methodist roots. The Orange Cooperative Parish is an expression of our connectional nature in which several churches work together in, in this case, an informal way in order to cultivate trust, mutual development, and more coordinated ministry among our congregations. The hope is to form a strong, faithful, missionally focused, and community centered Cooperative Parish among Walnut Grove UMC, Cedar Grove, Efland, Pleasant Green, Union Grove, Hillsborough, and Chesnutt Ridge. Some of our first shared projects have included: a booth at Hillsborough's Last Fridays, a local youth mission week (which took place the week of July 7-13), bi-weekly lectionary group meetings among the clergy, planning for a shared youth retreat in the fall, developing a common language with an emphasis on gifts, mutuality, and "neighboring," and finally, applying for a Duke Endowment grant to help us facilitate and implement this work.

Each time we gather, we remember something that would be easy to forget in this day and age: that we are truly more than the sum of our individual parts. That we are better together. That each time we gather, the Spirit is moving and working among us. There is energy, enthusiasm, and joy in our midst. We believe that God is working in the church and calling us to more. We believe that the Methodist Churches in Orange County have a unique opportunity to be alive and faithful as we do kingdom work together. It is not wrong to go back and fetch that which we have forgotten. Sometimes, it requires moving forward with our bodies, looking back at who we are, trusting deeply in who God has called us to be.

### <u>PGUMC to Host Corridor District</u> <u>Lay Servant Ministries Classes</u>

Lay Servant Ministries is offering two classes on Saturday, September 7, 2019. Each class is open to anyone interested. The two classes are excellent resources to help with leading small group studies or to enhance your understanding of The United Methodist Church, and each one is part of the courses needed to become either a Lay Servant, Certified Lay Servant, or Certified Lay Speaker if you are interested in pursuing that qualification.

Classes will be in session from 8:00AM until 4:30PM. Check in for the classes begins at 7:30 AM in the Narthex at Pleasant Green UMC.



#### **Our Communications Circle**

- Ezra 3: 11 And all the people shouted with a great shout, when they praised the Lord, because the foundation of the house of the Lord was laid.
- Luke 6:48 He is like a man which built a house, and digged deep, and laid the foundation on a rock; and when the flood arose, the stream beat vehemently upon that house, and could not shake it; for it was founded upon a rock.

When we read scripture about a strong foundation, we may think it applies more aptly to our church Trustees, who are charged with maintaining the building. The words of Ezra and Luke may very well apply to the Trustees and Administrative Council but there are other foundations as well. This month, we are praying for the Communications Circle, which provides the strong foundation of maintaining relationship with God among our past and present worshippers. The Communications Circle includes the Archives and History group, led ably by Terri Leonard (Church Historian and Legacy Leader), accompanied by Jo Anna and Jane Umstead. This group preserves the materials and story of our church so that those of us today may appreciate who we are and where we have come from. We have many strong people from the past, who weathered many floods, to learn from and build on. The words from the PGUMC information brochure say it best:

For more than 180 years, since 1832, there has been a Methodist presence on this hallowed ground in Orange County. Our history is all around us. From the old trading road (some say that Francis Asbury, the first Methodist Bishop, once traveled) that runs behind the church to the Eno River, to the cemetery. As you enter the church property your feet are where the saints of old have walked. When visiting our facilities, people will often comment on how beautifully the "new" sanctuary addition mirrors the "old chapel", a seamless fit, as it were. This is an interesting observation. Actually it was not seamless at all. It was the powerful result of a carefully devised, intentional compromise. It was a plan which embraced our past while keeping an eye toward the future. And that is where we find ourselves, in a between time, other-wise known as the present-time which links our past with our future. With our rich history comes the realization that we are responsible to leave a legacy for those who will follow us, a legacy of faith in Jesus Christ, a legacy of Christian community, and a legacy of living out the mandates of the gospel. All our history points us to a tremendous future. All we need do is be faithful to the present.

That is where our Audio/Video Ministry picks up. Mike Quinn is the Chair. On Sundays and other times during the week, you can see Mike Quinn, Larry Flannery, Ceil Matthews, John Micol, Jim Perry or Sheila Cook working the controls in the sound booth to make sure our liturgists, pastor, and choir are heard. At other times, they set up the microphones for special events, helping everyone present hear what is said, sung, or played. Trouble-shooting audio-visual equipment glitches is another of their specialties. Their ministry goes beyond the walls of the church; for this group records the Sunday services and burns them on DVDs for distribution to our homebound members. Is there a better way to be faithful to the present, using the technologies of today to strengthen the spiritual foundations of our members today and tomorrow? Let us pray...

Dear Great Communicator, the One who is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow, the One who teaches us that the strengths of the past is a foundation for our relationship with you today and tomorrow. Please bless the members of the Communications Circle and their families. Help them to know that you and we value their work and ministries. Help them to feel your presence as they fulfill the sacred responsibilities you have given them. If it is pleasing to you, give them the persistence, knowledge, wisdom, and commitment to keep building those foundations, so that people of the present and tomorrow may benefit from your compassion and planning. Amen.

St. Mary's Chapel 67th Homecoming Location: the corner of Schley & St. Mary's Rds

St. Mary's Chapel was established in 1759 for the purpose of holding Anglican services in Orange County for the homesteaders who lived in the vicinity of the "Trading Path." The Gothic Revival Style Chapel that now stands was constructed of hand-made brick in 1859. Regular services were discontinued in the 1930's. An annual "Homecoming Day" has been observed for the last sixty-six years.
