Running in the Dark

For the fourth year in a row, I have joined a group of Methodist pastor friends on a 200-mile journey (by foot) from Raleigh to Atlantic Beach. Each member of the team ends up running between 15-20 miles and one thing that is always a guarantee is at least one night run. So at about 10:30pm on a Friday night, I started gearing up for a 9-mile run through the country roads of Duplin County. Headlamp – check. Blinky light on the back- check. Headphones – check (even though this was against course rules). Chewing gum – check (a running necessity of mine).

I've done this race a number of times but one thing that never ceases to amaze me is what happens in the late night hours and the wee hours of the morning. It seems that when darkness sets in, there is a new sense of excitement and adrenaline that take over. I'm certainly not saying that it is always *fun* running at 2am when you haven't slept or eaten properly and muscles are cramped up. But, I *am saying* that something new happens: your senses are awakened; there is a mystery to the night that isn't present during the day; you can see your breath; you feel alone until you glimpse another blinking light from a runner in the distance or hear the howling of an owl in the backwoods of rural eastern Carolina. The imagination is reignited. You feel every strike of the pavement and become more aware of the sensation in your body.


It feels a lot like... Advent. A season that comes in darkness. A season that contains the longest night of the year – where grief sneaks up on us and joy moves in and your heart can hardly hold it all. A time when something new is being birthed but not yet here. The imagination is sparked. It's a season that demands a different kind of vigilance. So we light candles to see in the dark. We listen to new sounds. We pay attention in different ways. It's not like running during the day. We have to take a closer look, be slightly more aware. This is what happens when I run in the darkness. This is the invitation of Advent.

Oh, and what an invitation it is. To turn inward to the places in our lives that have been ignored, or feared, or shunned. To turn outward to the neighbors that have been forgotten. To dream about the new thing that God is doing in our midst but only knowing it as mystery. To pay attention to the very parts of God waiting to be unleashed. The invitation is to go into the darkness of the season and bring it into the light.

In Advent, we remember that the dawn is not yet here. We also take courage that there are gifts in the darkness. And so we grab our lights, we lace up our shoes, we add an extra layer of clothing. We hear the sounds of creation whispering in their nests. We can't see much, but we can see our breath, reminding us that we are alive. It comes around every year. And every year, we have a new opportunity to participate and be present. Will you walk this Advent journey? My answer will always be yes. Because it's a little bit like running in the dark. *–Laura*

O God, Our Help in Ages Past

Janice Nicholson, a member of the Prayer Ministry, wrote this meditation to help her process recent traumatic events. It is worth sharing with everyone; so that you can benefit, too.

On the weekend following the shootings at a synagogue in Squirrel Hill, PA, I attended a Shabbat service at a service in Raleigh as part of the "Show Up for Shabbat" movement. The service reminded me of what an interconnected world we live in. A former rabbi at the Raleigh synagogue is now one of the rabbis at Tree of Life synagogue. He has presided over three funerals for members of his congregation whom he saw be killed. A member of the Raleigh congregation grew up in Squirrel Hill. Another person was a relative of the one of the people killed.

The rabbi told us that in addition to the five senses, there is a sixth sense of memory. For the Jewish community the murders in a synagogue are part of a history of persecution. His own grandparents fled Russia and the Cossacks. Many members of the congregation lost much of their family in the Holocaust. If you have wondered why the news reports from Pittsburgh noted the high proportion of Jewish families in Squirrel Hill, it is because Jews used to be prohibited from living in many areas. So when they found a community in which they were welcome, they clustered there. I grew up near the Columbus, OH suburb of Bexley which has a similar concentration of Jews. I learned to swim at the Jewish Community Center because the Jewish community wanted to be inclusive of their neighbors even as they knew there were many parts of Columbus in which they were unwelcome. As I listened to the rabbi speak, I realized I was hearing the background of the hymn "O God, Our Help in Ages Past, Our Hope for Years to Come." Those who trust in God and remain faithful to God recognize that God has given them the strength to persevere in the face of hardships. And because they have that memory of God's presence and power, they can move forward with hope even in the midst of fearful times.

Thanksgiving is a quintessential American holiday. It is not a holiday exclusive to one race or one religion. It is a holiday for all those want to give thanks for the blessings we experience each day. And as we give thanks for the past and the present, we can move forward in faith knowing that God has been our help in the past and will continue to be a source of strength and hope in the days ahead.


