The Greatest is Love

In Paul's first letter to the Corinthian church in chapter 13 and verse 13 he offers a solution to the discontent he addressed in chapter 12. In chapter 12 he told them that they were all important to the kingdom. He urged them to understand that each person and each gift was important to the work of Kingdom building. But in chapter 13 he says he would show them a more excellent way, and that is the way of love. In other words, love is the answer to all of the confusion, misunderstanding, and wrong feelings they were dishing out to each other. He shared with them that in comparison to faith, and hope that love is the greatest.

Well we would agree with the Apostle that love is greatest among the attributes of God, for God is love, says the scripture. But when we have love and no hope then what will we profit? If we have love and no faith then what will we accomplish? If we are a married couple and deeply in love but we have no hope for our future then our love will soon disappear. If we are good parents and deeply love our children but one is gravely ill and the doctors have done everything possible to heal; then they admit without the help of the Almighty our child will not survive.

At such a time we realize that love is wonderful, but it must be accompanied by faith and hope. As a matter of fact it is love which causes us to have hope and faith. It is what causes our hope to have a foundation, and it is what gives our prayers faith. Yes the greatest is love, for without it our efforts are in vain.

During the month of February we celebrate Valentine's Day. Valentine's Day is when we celebrate love. But which expression of love do we celebrate? Do we celebrate the love we have for family and friends, called in the Greek *Philo*? The love as expressed by Ruth for her mother in law Naomi, when she said, "where you go I will go, and where you stay I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God will be my God." (Ruth 1:16) This expression of love is best seen in family and best friends.

What expression of love do we celebrate on Valentine's Day? For many it will be the expression of *Eros* love, the love of a significant other. We will celebrate it with candy and flowers or a night on the town, which is wonderful. Well God does recognize this expression of and celebrates it with us. This love relationship is expressed in scripture, according to the Song of Songs: "Let him kiss me with the kisses of his mouth, for your love is more delightful than wine. Pleasing is the fragrances of the perfumes." (Song of Songs 1:2-3)

What expression of love do we celebrate? Will we celebrate *Philo* love, *Eros* love or will we also celebrate *Agape* love; a higher love, as expressed by God, as the Apostle John explains: "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in him should not perish, but might have everlasting life." (John 3:16)

My friends, I declare to you that we should celebrate all aspects of love. We celebrate love of family and friends, love of spouse or a significant person, our love of God and His love of us. For I employ you that indeed Love is the Greatest.

Dear Heavenly Father and Guardian of all of your church children,



From El Salvador Mission Team...

After meeting, the PGUMC Mission Team thought that we need to address some common concerns of our fellow church members. One of the primary desires of the Mission Team AND the church is for EVERYONE who is feeling the call to participate in a mission experience have that opportunity. We have all had questions and doubts when we made our decisions to participate.

Several common concerns we were able to identify:

- 1. The cost. It is true that the church's mission trips have involved costs to the participants. We have created and participated in numerous fund-raisers to offset these costs. In the past, the Team has asked the team members to come up with a nominal "deposit" to make the plane reservations. In most cases that is the only direct cost that was seen by the team members. We either raised the remaining funds for the trip or others in the congregation have generously donated to cover the costs. We have always been able to cover the costs in the past and trust we will in the future. We are sincere in wanting to stress however, that even if the deposit we have asked for in the past is seen as a deterrent, we do not want that to prevent anyone from participating. With that in mind, we do NOT plan on "requiring" a deposit for upcoming trips. We trust in the faith and generosity of both the participants and the PGUMC congregation. We will find a way to make it happen.
- 2. Safety. There have been reports in the news lately of violence, primarily gang and drug related, in many Central American countries and specifically El Salvador. The Mission Team, our sponsors and friends in El Salvador are well aware of potential security concerns. The Team takes every precaution and avoids dangerous situations. We have not felt any undue concern being there and hope it won't prevent others from participating.
- 3. Language. It is true that El Salvador is a Spanish speaking country. It is also true that in many of the places we work and visit, few of the local population speak English. There are interpreters with the team during formal "events" and on work sites. Also, several team members speak Spanish with varying degrees of fluency. It is not a problem that should deter anyone. Take it as a challenge to try another language, it's fun.
- **4. You'll get sick.** No, you cannot drink the water. However, you will be constantly supplied with SAFE bottled drinking water. You will get supplied SAFE meals to eat. We have also found that other methods have been used, probiotics, etc., that seem to be effective at preventing most tummy problems. That being said, people have gotten sick and the possibilities are there. However, if you were to ask anyone who has gone and gotten sick, most would still think the experience was worth the risk.


Sunday School Nursery Available February 14

Therefore as good disciples of Jesus Christ let us welcome children and make Pleasant Green a children friendly congregation.





At Methodist Home for Children, we work to provide safe, stable homes where children can thrive and live fully into their God-given potential. While not always traditional or biological, an MHC home is where both child and family are equipped to succeed. It may be a group home that helps juvenile offenders transition to healthy, independent living or a foster home that shelters a child while his family is stabilized. Whatever form it takes, the end goal is always the same—a safe, stable home.

Methodist Home for Children, headquartered in Raleigh, is a 501(c)(3) that works to ensure safe, nurturing homes for children while working to eradicate the social and family problems that lead to abuse, neglect, family disruption and abandonment.

The first building was completed in late 1900, and the first child was admitted in January 1901. By year's end, Methodist Orphanage was home to 28 children.

Founded in 1899 as a traditional, campusbased orphanage, we now provide community-based services for children and families throughout North Carolina. We partner with public agencies to serve children in crisis and we raise private funds to ensure that we can deliver the best in evidence-based services.

PLANNED GIVING: IRA UPDATE

Congress renewed and made permanent a popular charitable IRA provision in the Protecting Americans from Tax Hikes (PATH) Act of 2015. This provision allows people aged 70½ or older to make direct charitable gifts from traditional and Roth IRAs to charities in a total amount up to \$100,000.

These gifts are free from federal income taxation. In addition, the income tax laws of most states also allow tax-free treatment for these gifts.

Making gifts from IRA funds that would otherwise lead to increased taxes can be a wise choice for many. This is especially true for those who must take required minimum distributions each year.
